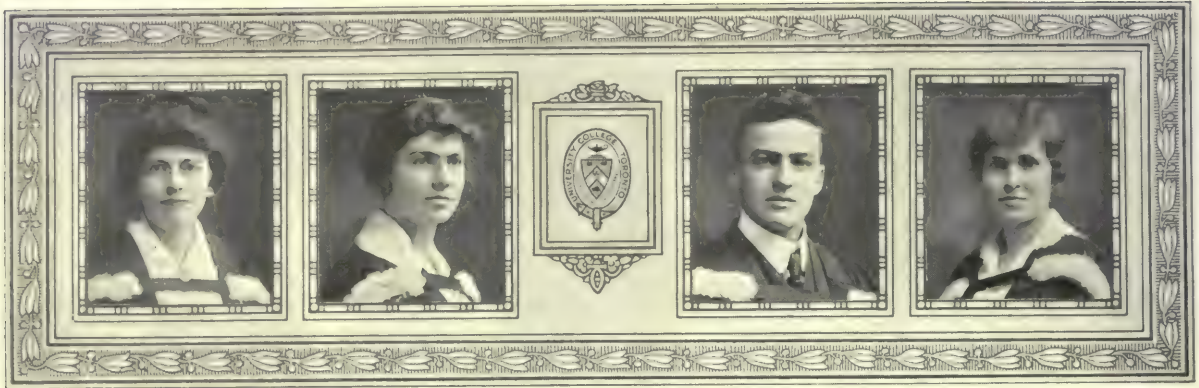

**L**ARGEST and most famous of all her classes, 1T7 literally crowded the stately halls of time-honored Victoria in the fall of 1917. One hundred and seventy-nine in all, they entered into College activities with a zest that no Sophomore assaults could dull. A few of our number, it is true, did find a temporary resting place in Sophomore coffins, but in the ensuing scrap the insult was amply revenged. The coming of the "Bob" brought with it confusion for our foes, and glory for ourselves. Song practices were harmonious and enthusiastic successes, and two prominent Sophomore members of the Bob Committee fell victims to Freshman vigilance when they tried to play the part of "Tom the Peeper." From the ordeal of the "Bob grinding machine" we emerged unscathed, while in comparison with our whole-hearted singing the Sophomore efforts sounded like the puny squeaks of pigmy Lilliputians. In spite of Sophomore machinations our Reception was declared a social success, while as orators, 1T7 girls and boys swept everything before them with Niagara-like impetus. For both oratorical prizes were captured by our silver-tongued Ciceros.

So the year passed until the goddess of May examinations held on high her fateful scales. She was indeed cruel to some, but 134 stout Sophomores returned to give the verdant Frosh the most interesting experiences any Freshmen ever had. In the grey dawn of early morning a strange sight was seen on Yonge Street, as painted and shackled Freshmen paraded behind a triumphal wheel-barrow. The annual scrap was staged with innovations. On Vic. Campus was planted a tall flag pole with the cross-bone and skull banner of the Sophomore warriors, and the baby carriage and milk can insignia of the Freshman host. There ignominious defeat befell the "Frosh." The "Bob" was a decided success, while we certainly added interest to the Freshman Reception, when, amid cheers and horn-

tooting, we placed their captive President on the chapel platform decked with the green insignia of his year. Once again the girls won the oratorical prize, and a Sophomore overcame all contestants at Vic. Athletic Meet. Our strong class spirit found expression in various social functions, though many of onety-seven's men were now hearing the Empire's call.

Despite the gloom the war cast over us, as Juniors we still "carried on" and a "hike" to Ward's Island was pronounced a decided success. The jolliness of this occasion was only surpassed by the eerie glories of Hallowe'en night when, at Annesley Hall, the girls royally entertained their classmates. Skating and sleighing parties were also thoroughly enjoyed.

Now Senior year comes round, and but sixty of us are here to face the camera. Sixty of our men are on active service, worthy representatives of their class. Yet those of us who remain must still "carry on" though the gloom of the bloody struggle thickens ever closer around us. So this year, once more, we "hiked," this time to Scarboro Beach, where, as the waves rolled in, weiners barked, marshmallows roasted and poetry came into being. Now our College course is closing, yet still before us lies the wide arena of life, where we must all acquit ourselves like true members of 1T7, and add lustre to our Alma Mater's name.

It still remains for us to send greetings to those of us who left these pleasant halls to uphold the ideals of Democracy and Freedom in far-off lands. Beyond all other years, 1T7 has responded to the Empire's call. Many of her men are across the seas in the fields of Flanders and of France; others are playing the game where the blue waters of the inland sea lave the classic shores of Greece and Macedonia; still others are on active service in bonnie England or our own fair Canada. Already two of our classmates, men who studied and played with us, have laid down their lives for their country. They have not died in vain. At the names of Capt. J. S. Wear and Major W. K. Campbell we bow our heads in sorrow for the loss of men who would have ranked high in our broad Dominion. Dying honorable deaths, they have left to us, who remain, a call to purer life and nobler action.

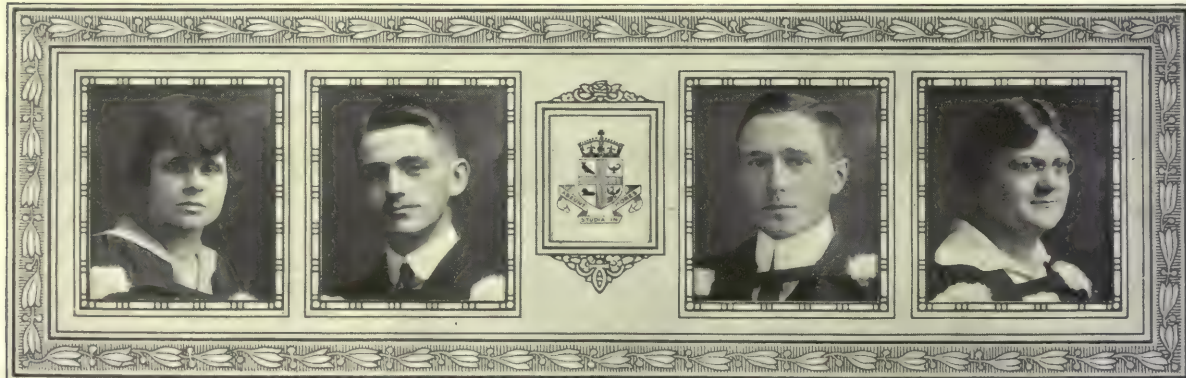

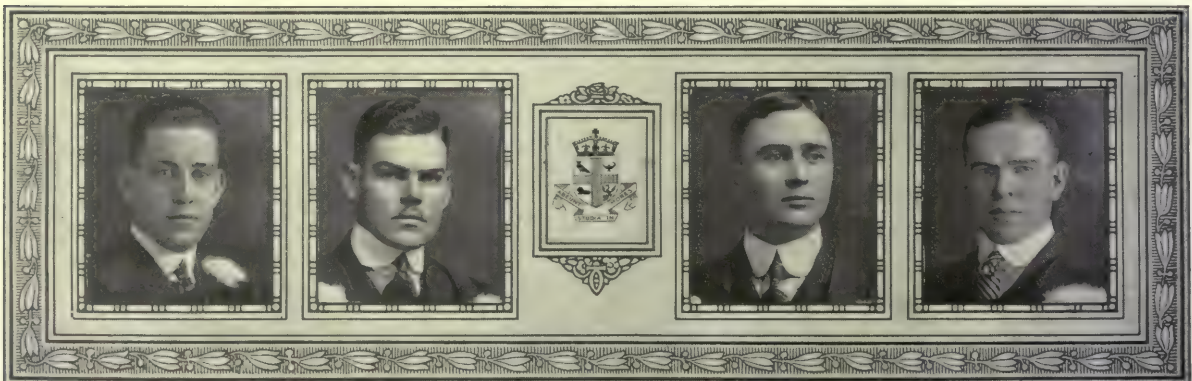

John Cecil Feeney was born at Marmora, July 11th, 1897. After receiving his preparatory education at St. Peter's School and the Collegiate Institute, Peterboro, where he passed his Senior Matriculation with honours, he registered at St. Michael's with Class '17, in 1913.

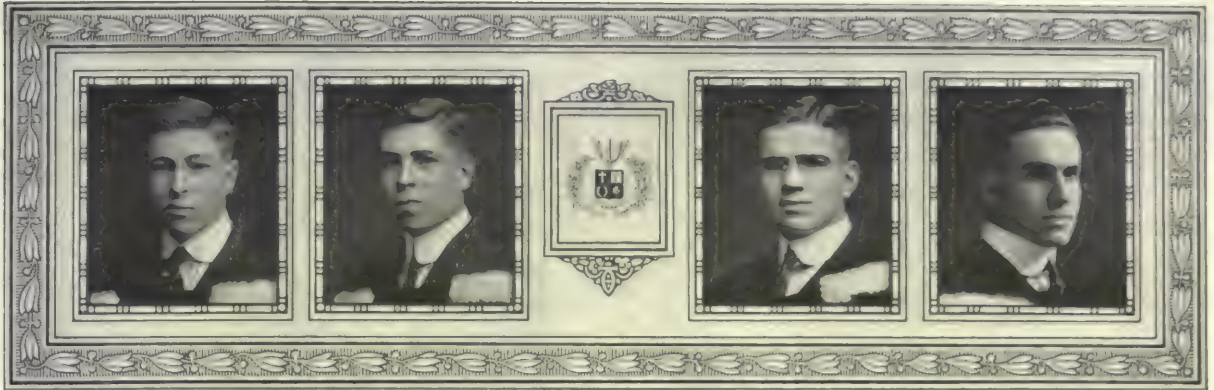
The acknowledged all-around athletic star of the College, "Cec." helped to bring home to St. Michael's the Dominion Intermediate Rugby Championship and played on the first Hockey and Baseball teams. He never allowed his athletic activities to interfere with his class work, however, and displayed a remarkable ability in his Philosophical studies.

He qualified for his lieutenancy with the C.O.T.C., but enlisted in February, 1916, as a private in the 5th Universities Company, reinforcing the P.P.C.L.I. After spending scarcely two months in the trenches, he was officially listed as killed in action on the 15th of September, 1916.

He leaves a mother and two sisters to whom Class '17 extends its heartfelt sympathy. His brothers, several in number, are also serving at the front.

His loss is a source of honest sorrow to the students of St. Michael's in general, but more especially to us, of Class '17, with whom he lived in close association for several years. May our prayers intercede for him and aid him in reaping the reward of his pious conduct, while in our midst, and his final sacrifice of his life for his country. *Requiescat in Pace.*

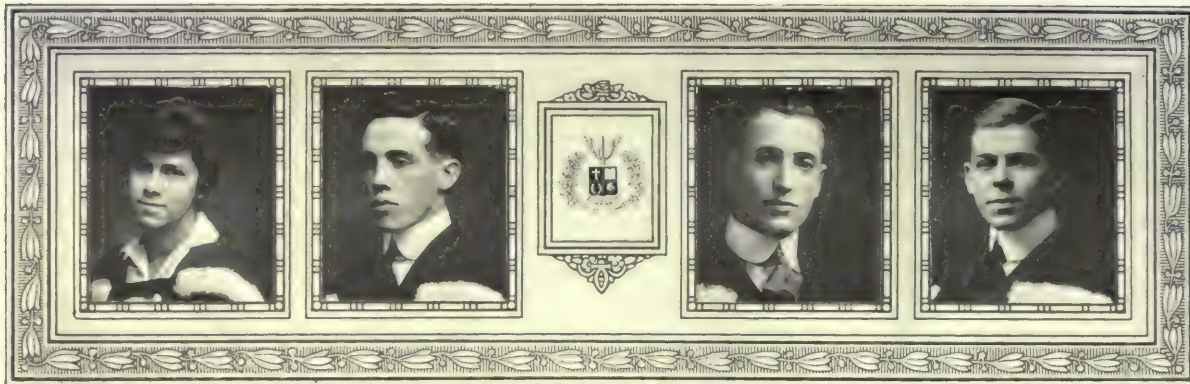

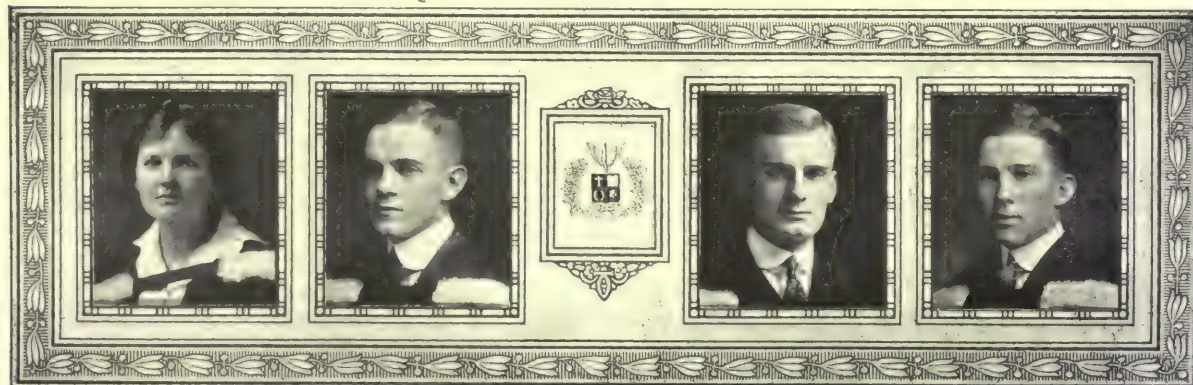

## The Medical Society

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**T**HIS has been an unique year in the history of the Medical Society. The outstanding feature has been the reality of two graduating classes during the College year. Much credit is due the members of the Faculty, who, although badly handicapped, have "carried on" continuously since October, 1915, in order to hasten the training of medical men for war service.

In the early spring of 1916 some twenty fourth year medical students returned from overseas to complete their course. During the spring and summer the fourth year work was done, and in September this Class passed into the fifth year. Now, in the spring of 1917, these men are graduating at the appointed time, although they have nearly a year of military service to their credit. The work has not been slighted or curtailed in the least, but holidays have been rigidly postponed till "après la guerre."

A similar arrangement was made for the members of the regular Class who completed their fourth year at the end of April, 1916. These men, on the first day of May, began their fifth year work. The month of July was, very fortunately, set apart as holidays. In December, 1916, this Class graduated. By courtesy of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, those graduates were enabled to take the Council Examinations before Christmas. A very large percentage of this class promptly joined the Canadian Army Medical Corps for service overseas.

The regular work of the Medical Society was faithfully carried out during this strenuous double session. Returned men took over the Senior offices in the fall of 1916. The Executive picture

is unusual, inasmuch as there are portrayed two Presidents, two Secretaries, and two Fifth Year Councillors.

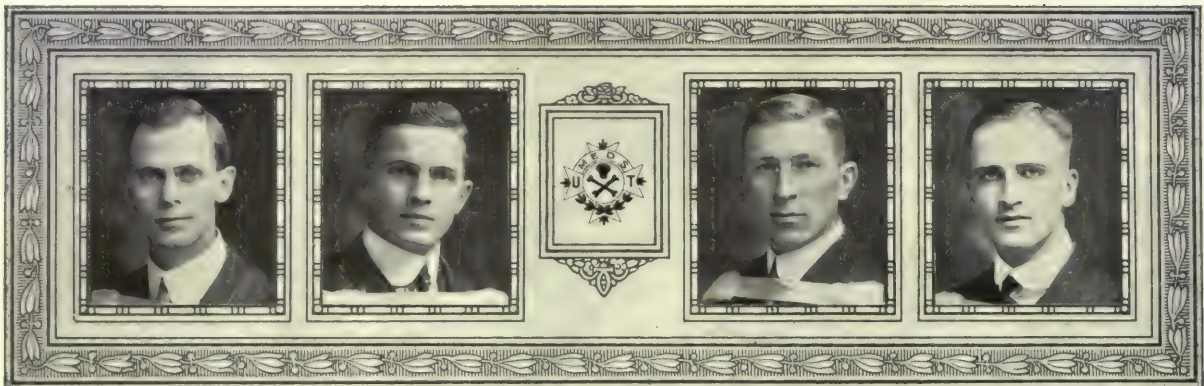
Daffydil Night was an unqualified success, in spite of the vast difficulties which the committee had to overcome. Much of the seasoned talent passed out with the men who joined the army in December. New men had to be trained under a new management. Great credit is due all concerned.

The "open meetings" of the Medical Society, which have been held at intervals of three weeks during this session, are worthy of special mention. In addition to hearing excellent addresses by members of our own Faculty, we have been delightfully entertained by prominent outside speakers. Good musical talent was provided for each meeting. The success of such a programme was made evident by a large and enthusiastic attendance.

A history of this year's events would be sadly incomplete without mention of the activities of our graduates and undergraduates on active service. Military Crosses and Distinguished Service Orders have been won on every front by members of this society; honor and distinction have been merited by all of our very numerous representatives in both Canadian and Imperial Services.

A few of our doctor-soldiers have paid the supreme penalty of their loyalty to King and country. It is our privilege and duty to offer our sincerest sympathy to the bereaved relatives and friends of those who went so gallantly to answer the "last roll call."

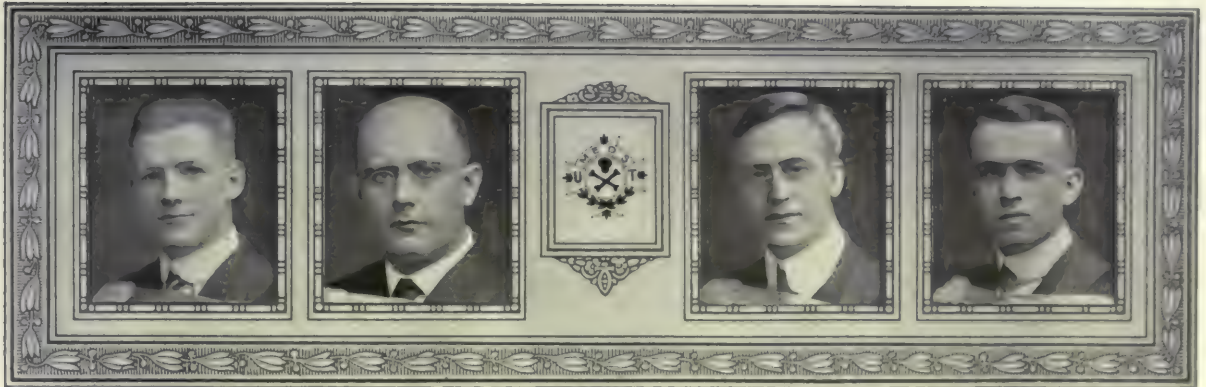
LIEUT. HAROLD H. OWEN

## Class--History--1T7

THE soft, balmy zephyrs of the clear days of early fall of 1912 conspired with the workings of Destiny to bring out the banner Class of the University. We left our ploughs, counters, ledgers, High School book, or the little red school on the half concession, and wended our several ways to the Mecca of our desires, which turned out to be the plain white brick building (factory style of architecture), with the wide windows staring at us like some prehistoric monster. The memories of the first few days are those of frantic searches for "places to register," the examinations of endless back rooms, "modern conveniences, moderate rates," under the appraising vulture eyes of the hardened "missus," the bewildering advice of friends "wise" to the game, the intricacies of the trails to the lecture rooms, the frantic appeals for a leader against the ancient tribe who previously possessed the lands, and a final morning of soft soap, blood, flour, blacking, hydrant, Soph., Freshie, mud and yells. Our duty done, we dutifully learned the intricacies of the parallelogram of forces, to speak guardedly of molecules, but glibly of ions, to pay fines for "weights out of order," to converse wisely about gastropods and pelecycopoda, and to distinguish the spheroid and the structures passing through the foramen magnum. Athletically, we led the way, beating our howling adversaries of the Second year in several pitched battles, gory and muddy, working our way through rugby, association, hockey, intercollegiate events "magno cum laudo," and best of all, when the long nights of smoke, stale restaurant pie and mutual quizzes had passed away, we emerged into our Sophomority, lean and scarred, but still going strong.

The Freshies looked with terror on the crowd waiting for them after the anatomy lecture, Christie pled and argued, the "Profs." threatened and upbraided tradition, but still they came out, and for an hour the battle raged, and still the tale is told of how the seventy vanquished the horde. Our Hallowe'en dance was graced by Toronto's fairest (our "Janes") and smoothest (us). This was the year of "the terrible tango trouble," but we dealt with it in a suitable way. Our athletes outdid themselves, winning 85 per cent. of the inter-faculty game credits, and 70 per cent. of the totals at the inter-collegiate. Out of 16 Med. boxers and wrestlers we had 10 winners from Onety-seven. Junior Meds. won the Mulock Cup and finished strong on the Allan Series. Honors in swimming and water polo also fell to us. We mastered the evolutions of the peritoneum with

keen discernment, revelled in the vagaries of the ethyl'd:prophylazoalpoaminobenzines, and also thought in terms of gram positive and extracellular cocci. Was it any wonder, gentle reader, that the masters of our fates with one accord cried, "Enough, pass on, show us the next!"

Our third year opened under a strain and shadow. Exponents of a barbaric philosophy had turned the world into a shambles. Several of our boys had gone at the sound of the first bugle, Owen, McKeough, Wigle, Price, McLinton, and others we have never seen since. The campus was filled with the best the University could produce, awkward squads, shrill voiced officers serious with their new honors, and the flapping of signallers encountered one on every side from four to six. Varsity companies were being recruited, groups of men were slipping away silently day by day and returning in khaki. The map of Europe with battling armies would be involuntarily visualized at lectures or lab. We saw No. 2 Casualty Clearing Station manned entirely by the best of our Seniors, and bade good-bye to over twenty of our own Class before the spring. The Base Hospital Unit was organized and took away dozens of our most capable clinicians and associates in this and other faculties. This year initiated us into the real study of medicine and surgery. We found out why the face flushed, thought we knew all about bronchial breathing (but we didn't as we afterwards learned to our sorrow) and other interesting and useful data. We were not dazed by the labyrinthine tortuosities of neurology, and between "incompatibles" we pondered long on the actions of digitalis on the spinal animal. Mars being in the ascendant, at the close of a shortened term, we signed several yards of officious looking documents, filled our water bottles, rolled our great coats a la Hipwell, boarded the Cayuga, and had a strenuous two weeks at Niagara Camp with the C. O. T. C. Our lines were daily inspected by such notables as Edis and Shirton, while McTavish made good at the mess tent. "Soda" was everywhere in evidence, and his warlike chest and guttural accents steeled our nerves in ferocious charges and made our shooting the standard in the Camp. Hardened by such manoeuvres, shining from frequent inspections from "Sam," and glib with many excuses for being late on parade, we were received back home with great applause.

Our military life still persisted in our Senior years and received great stimulus from our comrades who returned from the front, late in the

year, to finish their course. Here we began to reap the fruits of our earlier experiences and the study of medicine took an entirely different form, becoming much more interesting. New fields of labor and phases of science kept daily pushing back our intellectual horizons. Already we have tasted of the comedies and tragedies which are a part of the daily hospital grind, but what will it be when we have to share the smiles and sorrows of the thousands of our future patients? (Kindly note the *thousands*.)

We stand upon the threshold of a new life, with new friends, changing ideals and sympathies. Contact with a hundred different men, of different ideas, natures and sympathies has rounded off the sharp corners of our own prejudices and opinions. We recognize now, only too actually, the immensity of our own limitations, and can respect Truth in whatever instrument she may work. We look out upon the turbulent future not without misgivings. In our parting there is

bound to be a note of sadness. No more will we see "Jeff" with his hairy band of Profs. do a "Hielan' fling" on Daffydil Night. Vitch, "Fin," "Happy," Reddick Thompson and dozens of others will juggle dances no more. Fuller is through arguing medicine. Tommy White's sparkling epigrams and anecdotes are already falling on other ears. Blayne and Mackenzie are making a few farewell tackles, and woe is me! However, we look forward to many happy reunions in the old school, Legislature and highest courts of medical advance—let the world watch the pace we set! In graduating we go forth as a Class in Khaki, a product of a special military summer session (and long, glaring, breathless August days) and march forth to do our little part in this world catastrophe. Preserving our best traditions, knowing each other as we do, we bid you "au revoir," and will try with the great Kitchener "to do our duty, fear God and honor the King."

## Class--1917--History

The fall of 1914 saw the inception of the C. O. T. C. and the University impressed with the gravity of the European conflict. During the summer of 1915 Clarke joined the Cyclists, and in the following academic year Mitchell and Hughson received commissions. When we re-assembled for our final year there was a further absentee in the person of R. L. Grow, who had accepted a temporary position with the Dominion Forestry Branch.

Thus of the original sixteen who began the course there are but four left to finish it. In 1915, however, unexpected reinforcements to our depleted ranks arrived from Norway in the person of Otto Nieuwejaar, who will graduate with us.

We have been in close association during our four years of College life, both in times of adversity and of prosperity, and we now go out to put into practice those principles which we have learned here, confident in the belief that we shall not discredit those who have given us the grounding in our chosen profession.

## Class--1917--History

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FOR over half a century the Ontario Veterinary College has taken a lead in the veterinary education of this continent, and it was with an awe-inspired feeling that we, the Class of 1917, assembled from various parts of Canada and the civilized world on Oct. 1, 1914, for a course of study in Veterinary Science. Upon our arrival we were pleased to find that the demands of higher education along veterinary lines had made a new home for the College necessary, and we, the Class of '17, were to be the first Class to enter as Freshmen the most completely equipped veterinary college building in North America. It was very pleasing indeed for us, who had assembled from the many and varied walks of life, to enjoy the privileges which this beautifully and modernly equipped structure afforded with its spacious laboratories, lecture room and clinic rooms all lighted, heated and ventilated in the most improved manner. Following our entrance we, of course, all went over the table, at the same time receiving such marks of distinction and honor which would entitle us to become real students of the O. V. C. Lectures began promptly and the hidden mysteries of Anatomy, Botany, Chemistry and Zoology were soon unfolded to us. During Prof. Kendrick's lectures in Chemistry "The Gunpowder Plot" was uncovered, while during laboratory hours the traditions of the College were again shattered.

Field day came in due time and it was particularly pleasing for us to meet for the first time with our Upper Class men and do the best we could to uphold the athletic attainments of the Class. While delving deeply into the hidden mysteries of our course in Zoology Dr. Addison was completely swept off his feet by the inquisition of one of our distinguished number as follows: "Dr. Addison, you say all plant and animal life originate from single cells, if so, where do trees branch off from such a source?" Dr. Addison's reply: "Well, Mr. —, no one but an Irishman would think of asking such a question."

Meanwhile Class affairs were organized with Dunnigan as President, who held things so well in hand that an onslaught by both the Juniors and Seniors was held in check, and had not the fire apparatus of the College been brought into action, much to our sorrow, been completely held in check.

Meanwhile spring exams. came which we all attended with aching hearts and trembling knees. These were soon over and we at once began to put our theory to the acid test of experience,

emerging from the ordeal thinking we were some doctors.

October, 1915, found fifty of our number back, ready, sound and fit. A few had fallen under the relentless stroke of the examiners. Clarkson and Stanley had responded to the call of the colors, and we all wished them Godspeed, good luck and a safe return. With M. I. Farrel as President, things were lively from the start, the Freshies being most royally received, together with molasses and harness oil as a septic dressing for the wounds received. Two of our most highly respected and distinguished Faculty members left during our second session, Dr. King Smith and Dr. Temple, responding to the urgent call of our King and country. A company of veterinary students, in response to the call for fit men, was soon organized in the College and many members of our Class joined eventually, adding fame to the University Corps.

October 1, 1916, found our number reduced to forty-three, Grover, Smith, Lavery, Ball and Harwell responding to the urgent call of the colors. We were also very sorry to lose Dr. Schofield, a highly respected and honored member of our Faculty. Class affairs now took up our attention, with Mahaffey as President, and under his leadership things were soon going smoothly. The Science Association was next organized, with A. A. Grange Honorary President, and W. H. Fitch as President; B. R. Atmore, Vice-President; David McClellan, Secretary and Treasurer.

Our course of Zootechnics now made it possible to visit the leading stock farms in the vicinity of Toronto, the John Gardhouse herd of Shorthorns, Dr. Hazzard's stud of Clydesdales, Percherons and standard bred horses, and the Sunny Brook Farms, with its prize winning hunters fresh from the prize ring at Madison Square, also its large working herd of Holstein-Friesians, together with its modernly equipped barns and equipment.

During the Field Meet, November 8th, the Seniors distinguished themselves with their bulldog tenacity, strong arms and ability to burrow deeply into the dirt and pull their end of the rope over the line in the tug-of-war.

Exams., State Boards, Science Association papers, long hours of plugging and frequent calls for money from home now occupied our time. Class '17 was the first Class to enjoy the new Veterinary Building on University Avenue during our entire course of study.

## Women's Undergraduate Association

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**T**O the Executive of the W. U. A. for the year 1916-17 has fallen the unique distinction of welcoming the women students of University College to their new clubhouse at 85 St. George Street. It is hard to believe that we have ever been able to get along without our "Union House," it has added so much to the charm of our College life this year. The large common room, with its cheerful fireplaces, its music and flowers, its "homey" air, in short—the cosy library, the pleasant dining-room and the excellent cuisine, but, most of all, the atmosphere of genial friendliness pervading the place, have each satisfied a need felt altogether too long by University College women. No efforts have been spared to make the Union House the centre of our College activities, and it is believed that the year 1916-17 has seen not only the growth of a new spirit amongst us, but also the beginning of a new era in the history of our College.

Another factor helping to draw the women students together has been the interest in Red

Cross work. For the third time the University has opened its sessions this year under the shadow of the great war, and although the ultimate victory of the Allies seems certain, yet it is plain that the best efforts of all are needed to insure final success. The chief business of the Executive has been, therefore, the enlisting of every student's aid, either in money or in work, for the University Base Hospital Supply Association. Well over one hundred women have been working regularly for the association. About \$300 have been raised in monthly subscriptions, and over fifty students have been taking the course in U. A. D. work. Interest has been stimulated by a series of fortnightly Red Cross teas, at which the students have gathered with their knitting to listen to brief addresses from prominent Red Cross workers.

Slight though these results may seem, yet we dare hope that in some small way we have helped restore to our beloved Alma Mater the old joyousness of the days before the war.

## Queen's Hall

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IT was midnight and the clocks were still reciting their perpetual tale, which is always beginning and always ending, and has the verses and refrain all mixed in one. There was the tall wooden clock in the hall, the same which made such indiscreet disclosures to a by-gone Torontonensis. With consistent snubbing, it had become brief and cryptic. "Uniforms and latch-keys, uniforms and latch-keys"—not another remark to be had from the hall clock.

Its colleague of the dining-room has more to say. It tells of scenes of mirth and madness; the ethereal green color scheme of the graduating dinner; the crimson glare of an initiation and the dancing limbs of Indian warriors in their paint; Bluebeard and his butchered wives; Sister Anne upon the watch tower; the Paris mob howling for the blood of Freshies. The dining-room clock has carried on by deputy more than one warm controversy with its subordinates at 184 College Street on the question of the Time of Day, and staunchly claims that seniority entitles it to set the pace. It recounts its memories and apostrophizes the new plush curtains in approving tones. Though they received no honorable mention in *The Globe*, they have as good a claim to be called "blest touch of civilization" as the salt cellars have, or the "broad, shallow steps" either, for that matter. "'Little amenities of life,' forsooth!" scoffs the dining-room clock.

From its position of privilege upstairs the little alarm clock not only keeps an Argus eye upon the signing-out book, but attends minutely to those conversations in a strangulated whisper which are breathed on the landing during Quiet Hour. Sometimes they are about an essay which someone "doesn't know how on earth to begin," sometimes impassioned requests for someone's "Friday Religion Notes," or perhaps a foraging party returns successfully from a raid on the dumb-waiter trickling tinned tomatoes. Here the impressive proctor pads by on slippered foot, or a general rush for the tea kettle heralds the hour of 10 p.m. Such are the mingled motifs of the alarm clock's soliloquy.

Dumb forever is its patient neighbor overhead, dumb because nobody ever winds it. No sound can it utter, though within full hearing five Seniors successively repeat "Tintern Abbey" on a wager, or the rising-gong, a yard away, grinds out a clamor which none but sleepy youth could ignore.

The last stroke of 12 falls from the City Hall tower, and each of our clocks, regretting that the municipal timepiece is not more exact, resumes its little chant, which is always beginning and always ending, and filled with scraps of new and old, like—no, not like life; let us say, for a change, like time.

## U.C. Women's Literary Society

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**T**HAT hardy perennial, the Women's Literary Society, burst once more into vigorous bloom on the fourteenth of October in the traditional form of the autumn tea. In all impartiality be it stated that the flowers that bloom in the spring, or any other season for that matter, pale into mediocrity beside this first fair blossom of the fall, and the particular specimen under consideration was peerless of its kind. Although it was thought advisable to restrict the expenses as much as possible, and simple fare was accordingly the order of the day, the plan of the preceding year in curtailing the formalities was not adopted, and this venerable feast of welcome was reinvested with all its accustomed glory of toasts and small tables.

Seizing most opportunely upon the trend of popular interest, the society in a happy hour set forth its programme of Russian literature. The aim was not so much to provide a course of study as to arouse a permanent interest in this great and comparatively unfamiliar field. Tolstoi, Tur-

genieff, Gogol, Dostouvsy, Tchekov, in brilliant succession lent their names to the meetings. With speakers like Dr. Alexander and Professor Will to act as guides into this fresh and enchanting realm, vast, mysterious, inexpressibly alluring, even as the "great mother" Russia herself; with delightful comedies like "Revizor," "Fruits of Enlightenment," and "The Bear," to lend additional life and color, it is not surprising that audiences were large and enthusiastic. Like many another organization, however, the Literary Society owes a debt of gratitude to the Women's Union for the comfortable quarters which contributed materially to the success of its meetings.

A most interesting experiment this year is the offering of prizes for original work in the shape of: (1) a short story, (2) a College song. At this present time of writing both competitions are still open, but there are already indications (two) that this laudable attempt to bring to light what genius is amongst us, has met with deserved success.

## University College Y.W.C.A.

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**T**HE following is a statement of the objects of the Young Women's Christian Association:

"To call the students to the knowledge of God in Christ Jesus and His discipleship in every department of conduct.

"To promote among them regular habits of Bible study and prayer.

"To lead them into the fellowship and service of the Christian Church.

"To keep before them the importance and urgency of world-wide evangelization, to Christian solution of social problems and the permeation of public life with Christian ideals."

Every morning, except Saturday, at 8.45 the Association conducts a meeting for intercession.

As an organization of students, we lay the greatest emphasis upon study. Other organizations, with which the student is usually connected, and especially the Churches, need the energy which she can spend in practical work. The spe-

cial function of the Association in College is to provide opportunities for the discussion and solution of the problems which must arise in the principles and practice of Christianity. The programme for this year includes six general meetings, which are intended chiefly to let the women know what the "Y" is doing and to arouse an interest in the various subjects which will be studied in the groups. Members of groups are expected to do a certain amount of reading, and, in the case of social study, of actual investigation.

There is no membership fee connected with the organization. A budget is made out at the beginning of the College year to include all the expenses, and the regular University collections for the support of a Missionary in India and for the University Settlement. After it has been submitted to a general meeting for adoption, a canvass is made of all the women students to secure the desired amount.

Very few students can take part in all departments of athletics, but just see the wide choice there is—tennis, basketball, fencing, hockey, swimming and physical culture.

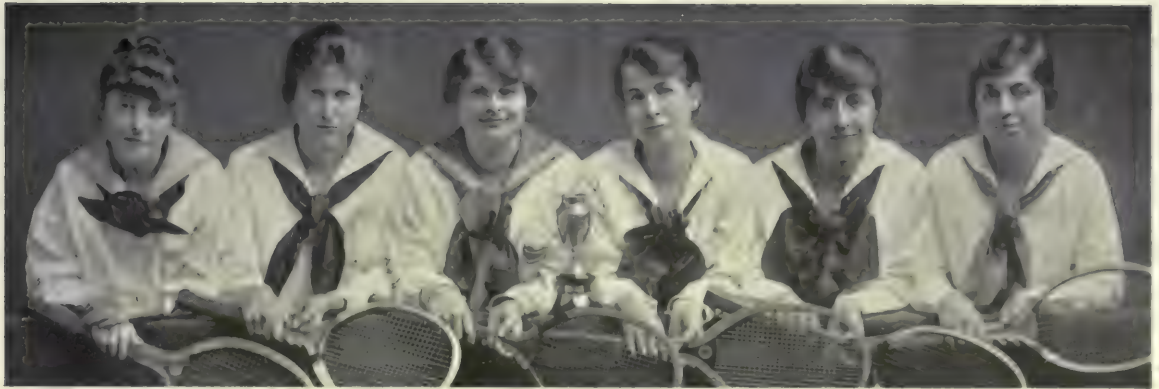

## Toronto Newman Club

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**T**HE Toronto Newman Club was established four years ago at the opening of the session, 1913-14, for all Catholic students attending the University Faculty of Education, Osgoode Hall and the Normal School. The Toronto Newman Club is but one link in a chain of such institutions established in connection with Universities in Canada, the United States and other countries.

For many years the need of such an institution in connection with the University of Toronto had been felt by Catholic students, whose numbers were rapidly increasing. Recognizing this necessity, and on account of his deep interest in the welfare of students, His Grace the Most Reverend Neil McNeil, Archbishop of Toronto, purchased at much expense a large residence for a clubhouse and had it suitably furnished. At the rear of the clubrooms was built a beautiful chapel capable of accommodating three hundred persons. Rev. J. E. Burke is the present Rector of the Club.

The home of the Newman Club, known as "Newman Hall," is located at 97 St. Joseph Street. Its proximity to the University makes it very convenient for its members. On the main floor are found the common room, library and dining-room; on the second floor, the gentlemen's lounging room, parlor and tearooms for the use of the lady members, also the office and study of the Rector. In the basement there is the billiard and pool room. So popular has the Club become that already the need of larger quarters is felt.

The object of the Club is threefold: It is to promote the religious, intellectual and social welfare of Catholic students. Mass is celebrated every morning during the week at 7.45 in order to allow students sufficient time to go to lectures. On Sunday Holy Communion is given at 9.15,

after which a breakfast is served in the dining-room. Mass is celebrated at 10 o'clock, at which a sermon is preached. On Sunday evenings, at 7.30, there is a sermon and benediction. Besides the purely devotional religious exercises, there have been organized a class in Religious Knowledge or Christian Doctrine and also one in Catholic Psychology. These two classes have been enthusiastically received by the members.

The literary and musical phase of the Club takes the form of a series of debates and musical entertainments given by the members throughout the year. This year there has been organized a series of lectures to be given by prominent business and professional men from different parts of Canada. At the writing of this article one of these addresses had been given by the Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier. At this event Convocation Hall was filled to its capacity and many hundreds were turned away. A silver collection was taken up to purchase articles for the soldiers.

The social side of the Club consists of a weekly entertainment on Friday evening in the form of a dance or concert held in the club rooms. An afternoon tea is given by the ladies each Wednesday, the proceeds of which go for some patriotic purpose. Every Saturday a twilight musicale is given by the ladies of the city who are interested in the welfare of the Club.

Since the war began a large number of the Club members have enlisted and are serving their country on the battlefields of Europe, both as officers and in the ranks.

If the Newman Club continues to flourish as it has in the past its future is assured. Its success is due to the excellent spirit of fellowship among its members which is expressed in the motto of the Club: "Cor ad cor loquitur."

## The Interrogative Club

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THE Interrogative Club is a practical experiment in co-education. In recent years a certain undercurrent of dissatisfaction seems to have been prevalent in College halls at the inadequacy of attempts to solve problems peculiar to the undergraduate. In particular, Miss McMurchie and Miss Harvey were dissatisfied. They saw that herding people into large classes and lecturing at them was stamping out all personality from the students. They saw that, while we aim at producing graduates of strong individuality, we really evolve nothing but crowds of people who have no idea that there ever was, or ever will be, any single problem that they are capable of solving by their own efforts—people who have not even discovered that they are different from one another. So their dissatisfaction grew and grew. At last, they were obsessed with the idea of holding discussions in small groups; and in the Easter term of 1912-13 they organized the Interrogative Club. Its membership, exclusive of those overseas and graduate members who are out of the city, is limited to ten women and ten men. The meetings of the Club are held on alternate Tuesdays at the home of Mrs. Fernow.

The name "Interrogative" was given the Club to indicate that its members have inquiring minds. "The Vagabonds" might have been a more appropriate name, because of the ease with which the members wander from the subject. What begins as a dignified discussion of the tariff may drift into an earnest argument about kindergarten teaching. Though one of the members of the Club is appointed as leader of the subject, his function is merely to introduce, and not to monopolize the discussion. The discussion itself is a general explosion of ideas, and the leader is but a spark to start the explosion, and not a candle to shed light upon the others. Consequently Professors are seldom admitted. If they are, they must consent to come muzzled. For the Club has this advantage over lectures—that every member, even the most reticent, may express his queerest and crudest opinions, and be tolerated. No one laughs at another's ideas, no matter how unusual they are. So far as we know, it is the only place in the University where uncensored thinking is permitted, even encouraged. When a Professor

finds himself invited to visit us, it is usually because he has shown himself to be very tolerant, and he may conclude that he is almost in a class by himself. We occasionally invite one for the purpose of asking him questions, and our motto for all Professors who come is Mr. Leacock's injunction: "Answer, but don't speak."

Mrs. Fernow's position is, like her personality, unique. She is at once a Professor and a student, not half Professor and half student, but actually both at the same time. In wisdom and in ability to dogmatize, she is in the class with the Professors, in everything else she is a student. She is a real futurist, living in the future and not in the past. That she is a real student, and not just a make-believe one, is shown by the fact that she never in any sense attempts to guide the discussion. She talks, of course, but not more than the others do, and nobody stands in awe of her. She talks just as the students do—expressing personal difficulties and asking questions, and at the close of the discussion, wonder of wonders, she does not sum up our conclusions and label them as principles which we must all accept. No, at the conclusion of the discussion she serves supper.

Dr. Fernow complains that we have never yet reached a conclusion. There is a chance that we may reach one some day and surprise him. If that ever happens, it is possible that the Club may come to an end. Meanwhile, its discussions are so heated and so stimulating that many of its members say that they would sooner give up any course of lectures they attend than relinquish their connection with the Interrogative Club.

# Canadian Officers' Training Corps

## University of Toronto Contingent

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THE Canadian Officers' Training Corps was organized on the 1st November, 1912, and was modelled on the lines of the British O.T.C. This was part of the scheme of Lord Haldane, Minister of War in the Campbell-Bannerman Cabinet, when the re-organization of the British Army was undertaken in 1908, and was designed to form a training school for officers in conjunction with academic training.

To quote the first clause of the Regulations for the C.O.T.C. published with General Orders No. 30, 1916:

"The primary object of the Canadian Officers' Training Corps is to provide students at universities and colleges with a standardized measure of military training with a view to their qualifying for commissions in the Active Militia . . . . By means of the facilities thus offered those who wish to serve their country with the least possible interference with their civil career, it is hoped that the supply of officers may be increased and that units may not only be complete in officers on mobilization, but also have a surplus in the junior commissioned rank in order to make good the losses which occur in war."

The first contingent was formed at McGill University, Montreal, on the 15th November, 1912.

For some years there had been under consideration at the University of Toronto, the formation of a purely C. O. T. C. contingent, and negotiations had been opened with the military authorities at Ottawa towards this end. But nothing was definitely arranged until the outbreak of the European War in August, 1914. Immediately upon the opening of the Michaelmas Term

in that year, negotiations were resumed, and, pending definite authority, a tentative organization was projected.

The University was fortunate in having upon its staff an officer of considerable experience both in Great Britain and Canada, who naturally became the head of the organization. Lt.-Col. W. R. Lang, Professor of Chemistry in the University, whose connection with the defensive forces of the Empire is referred to above, had been recalled from his holiday in Europe to take over work at Headquarters of the 2nd Division in Toronto, and being relieved of his usual academic work, during the war, was able to give his whole time to military duty connected with the education of officers.

Shortly after the term opened 700 men of all faculties and colleges were drilling without equipment and in quarters provided by the University authorities.

On 2nd November, 1914, formal authorization was given for the establishment of the University of Toronto Contingent C.O.T.C., on a nine-companies basis, in effect from 15th October, 1914, and on 15th December, 1914, an additional three companies were authorized, to be followed on 15th July, 1915, by the authorization of a company to be called the University Club Company. On 18th January, 1915, Lieut.-Col. W. R. Lang, C.E., was attached and detailed to command the contingent dating from 15th October, 1914.

The establishment of the Battalion Staff was authorized as follows:

During the session 1914-15, the work of the corps was prosecuted with diligence and enthusiasm, and at the annual inspection on April 10th and 13th, 1359 members were declared "efficient."

An inspection of the entire corps (1459 of all ranks) was made by H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief, on Jan. 22, 1915.

After considerable uncertainty the Militia Dept. gave permission for the holding of a camp at Niagara in May, and on April 30th, an advance party proceeded there to make preparations. On Sunday, May 2nd, the McGill Contingent arrived, to be followed the succeeding day by the University of Toronto Contingent, 709 of all ranks. A profitable two weeks were spent in practical and tactical work, and on May 14th, the entire corps was inspected by H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, and the Inspector General for Eastern Canada, Major-General Lessard, C.B.

The proficiency examinations were held on Thursday, April 1st, 153 being granted certificate "A," the qualification for Lieutenant.

When the term opened in October, 1915, the C.O.T.C. at once resumed activities. Notwithstanding the large number who had graduated, been appointed to commissions in overseas units, or who had enlisted, there was a large enrolment of Freshmen and the strength of the corps was 1781. 640 members returned to college and 1141 new members were enrolled. From enlistments and other causes this was reduced to about 1200 by the New Year, and still further to 951 on inspection. Students from the Ontario Veterinary College were admitted, and a platoon of K Com-

pany was made up entirely of members of the teaching staff. The University Club Platoon was organized as N Company. During the Michaelmas Term a series of successful field days were held on successive Saturdays at Cedarvale, and on Sunday, November 14th, a Church Parade was held at Convocation Hall. The corps suffered considerably through the loss of many of its best officers and members who left to take up Active Service duties in Canada, or to join the Canadian Expeditionary Forces.

The annual inspection took place on 31st March and 4th and 6th April, 1916, with a parade state of 33 officers and 916 rank and file.

The written examinations for Certificate "A" were held on March 25th, when 125 members qualified for Certificate "A."

In November, 1915, the British War Office signified its willingness to accept members of the corps as candidates for commissions in the British Army. These were selected by the Chief of the General Staff in person, and the first draft of 31 candidates left on the 30th December, 1915, to be followed by the second draft of 35 on March 20th, 1916; third draft of 21 on June 15, 1916;

fourth draft of 35 on Aug. 18, 1916; fifth draft of 21 on Oct. 22, 1916; sixth draft of 13 on Dec. 27, 1916; seventh draft of 30 on Feb. 23, 1917.

At the opening of the Michaelmas Term, 1916, the enrolment was 460, viz., 10 officers and 450 rank and file, 85 of whom were former members. While the number of companies was necessarily reduced, the work was carried on enthusiastically, and a special class was arranged for signalling instruction. From time to time, many members enlisted for Overseas and National Service, while 78 officers of the corps are with various units of the C. E. F., and 13 are serving on the permanent staff of the Military District, principally in connection with instructional work.

As far as can be ascertained at this writing 1248 past and present officers and members of the corps are on active service, viz., 470 serving as officers and 778 in the ranks in various branches of the service.

An Honor Roll is appended, containing 46 names of those who have made the supreme sacrifice, as far as can be ascertained at this date, March 31st, 1917.



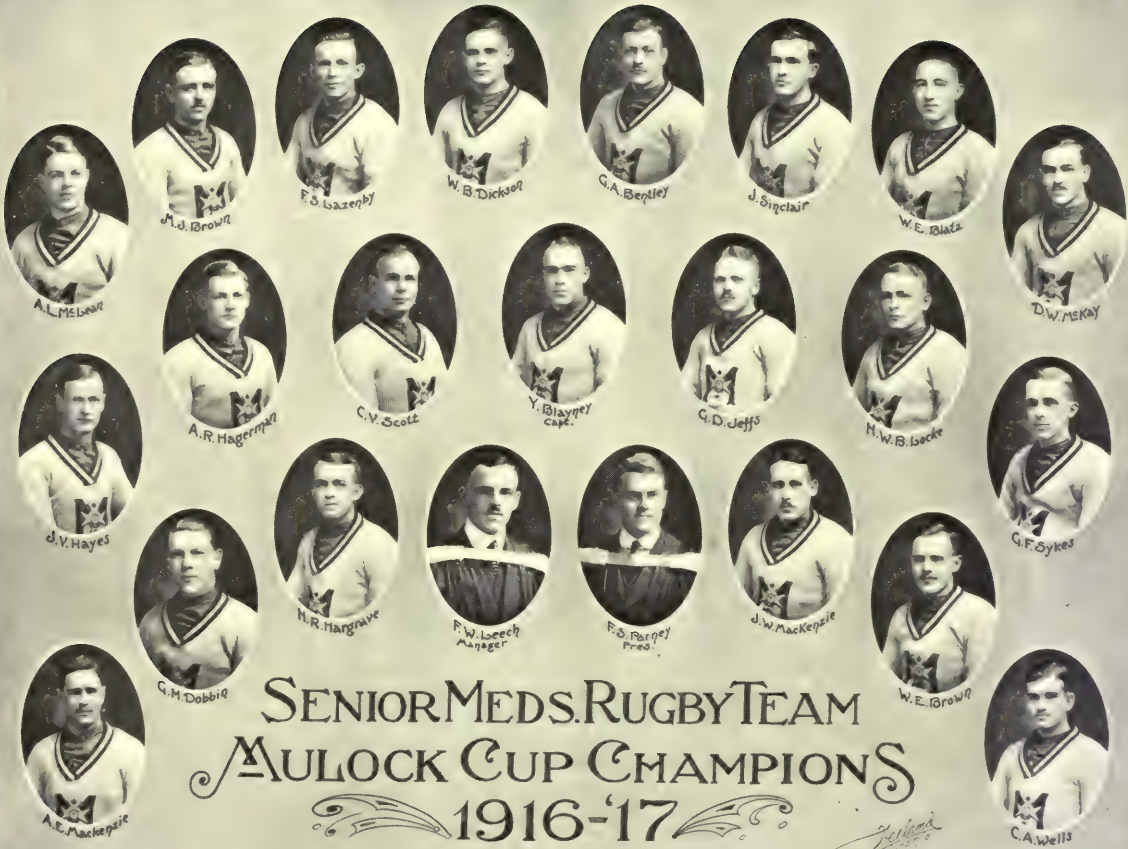

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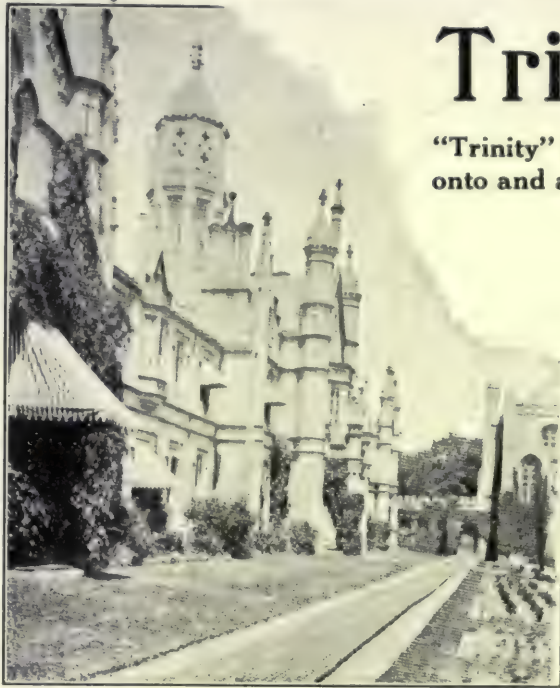
